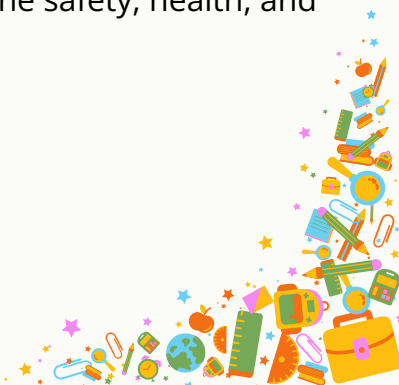

STUDENT ATTENDANCE

It is expected that all students attend school daily, unless they are ill or have a medical appointment. All students must be at school no later than 8:30 a.m.

Teachers are completing attendance and will be marking students late as of 8:45 a.m. which is the end of the morning announcements.

Persistent tardiness and/or absences must be reported by the school to the Attendance Counselor.



SIGNING OUT

Please try to avoid calling the school to have your child sent down before you arrive; students will be called only after your arrival to minimize missed instructional time. Written permission is required if your child leaves with another adult.

These procedures ensure your child's safety.



FREEDOM OF INFORMATION

Emergency and Freedom of Information forms will be sent home with each child. Please ensure the information on the emergency form is correct. If there are changes to be made, please make them directly on the form.

The FOI form asks for consent by way of having parents/guardians respond to a number of specific statements. Please sign, date and return the forms to the school as soon as possible.

STUDENT BEHAVIOUR EXPECTATIONS



It is the expectation of the YCDSB and St. Patrick Catholic Elementary School that students will:

- demonstrate honesty and integrity

- respect differences in people, their ideas and their opinions
- treat one another with dignity and respect, especially when there is a disagreement

- take appropriate measures to help those in need

- demonstrate respect for people in positions of responsibility
- respect the need of others to work in an environment that is conducive to learning and teaching
- be courteous and polite at all times

ST. PATRICK DRESS CODE AND INDOOR SHOES

In keeping with the distinctiveness of our Catholic schools, the York Catholic District School Board believes that a student Dress Code fosters: a sense of belonging and pride; a safe and respectful environment for learning and teaching; and a confident and positive sense of self and respect for the dignity and welfare of others.

At St. Patrick, an appropriate dress code continues to be in effect. As such, students are expected to dress for school in appropriate attire. Clothing items worn to school should reflect and demonstrate a sense of modesty that is conducive for learning.

For Physical Education, all students must be dressed in appropriate attire as per teacher directions, including running shoes. All students require a pair of indoor shoes, with non marking soles to be kept at school. Slippers, crocs and flip flops are not acceptable during Phys Ed classes for safety reasons. We thank you in advance for your continued and ongoing cooperation and support.

CELL PHONE POLICY

In alignment with the Ministry of Education's updated Provincial Code of Conduct (PPM 128), we are reinforcing our school's cell phone policy to limit distractions and maximize learning time. At school:

Cell phones must be off and out of sight during instructional hours.

If a student is seen using a phone:

- a. First time – Educator will ask the student to put it away.
- b. Second time – Student sent to office; phone stored until end of day.
- c. Repeated incidents – Parent will be contacted; phone stored in office and must be picked up by parent; progressive discipline will follow.

Devices may be used for:

1. For educational purposes as directed by a teacher.
2. For medical reasons (a parent note is acceptable).
3. To support special education needs.

If you need to reach your child during the day, please call the main office at 905-294-1571.

We ask that parents/guardians review this policy with their children and support staff in upholding it.

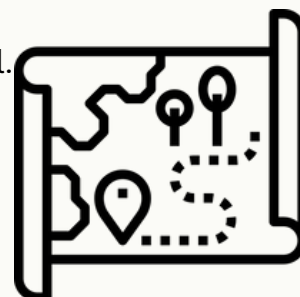

Letters with more details have been sent home during the first week of school.





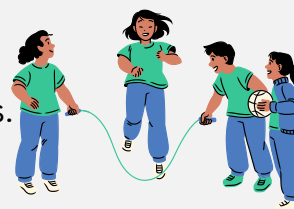

RECESS EXPECTATIONS

As a school, we prioritize safe and enjoyable play among our students, emphasizing the use of appropriate ball equipment. When the field is closed, no soccer balls are allowed on the pavement for safety reasons. Basketballs are allowed on the pavement. When the field is open, soccer balls are permitted on the field. This aims to prevent injuries, particularly head injuries, by encouraging the use of safe alternatives like tennis balls and softieze balls, alongside soccer balls on the open field.

Additional safety guidelines include:

- Avoid physical contact; keep hands and feet to yourself.
- Refrain from engaging in contact sports.
- Use soft balls such as tennis balls and nerf balls.
- Stay within designated school boundaries.
- Seek assistance from the teacher on duty when needed.
- Resolve conflicts using appropriate language and restorative methods.
- Foster cooperative play among peers.
- Always demonstrate kindness in words and actions.



Remember, respect is not just a word but an active principle guiding our interactions with others. Let's treat each other as we would like to be treated, making respect a cornerstone of our school community.

SAFETY WEEK

SAFE AND CARING SCHOOLS



Safety Awareness week takes place during the final week of September. The beginning of the school year is a strategic time to remind everyone of safety routines relating to the school environment. Parents, students, and staff are reminded of the importance of safety awareness and education.

St. Patrick will also include emergency preparedness and other environmental safety concerns. Safety drills such as fire drills, extreme weather drills, intruder drills and lock downs will be practiced by staff and students.



ANAPHYLAXIS

The York Catholic District School Board (YCDSB) is committed to safeguarding students with life-threatening anaphylactic allergies through a collaborative effort involving families, healthcare providers, and the school community.



In accordance with Policy 206, parents must promptly inform the school of any allergies and complete required forms that have been sent home. Parents are encouraged to provide two up-to-date EpiPens—one for the child to carry and one for the office.

As St. Patrick is a peanut/nut-free school, students are not permitted to share food and outside treats (e.g., for birthdays or special events). Fast food is strongly discouraged due to cross-contamination risks. We thank families for their cooperation in keeping all students safe.

EPILEPSY



We ask that all seizure Health Management Plans be returned to the school on the first day of school for processing. Parents will be contacted if information is incomplete. Provide the Principal with an updated Epilepsy Health Management Plan in the event of changes to the diagnosis or action plan. All forms must be signed by the physician.

ASTHMA

The York Catholic District School Board acknowledges that asthma can be life-threatening and requires a team approach for effective management, involving students, parents/guardians, healthcare providers, and the school community.

Parents are asked to provide one up-to-date inhaler for their child, either to be carried by the student or kept by a responsible adult at school, depending on the student's age and readiness.

PEDICULOSIS

The York Catholic District School Board recognizes concerns related to pediculosis (head lice) at the school and community level. Pediculosis (head lice) are not a public hazard, as they do not cause illness, but they are a nuisance. To prevent pediculosis (head lice) from becoming a problem at our school we all need to work together.

Please check your child's head on a regular basis for lice or nits. If you do find lice or nits, you must contact the office so that we can notify other parents in your child's class to keep a special watch for any signs of head lice. A student's readmission to school is contingent upon the Parent/Guardian submitting a completed and signed "Pediculosis Treatment Form" communicating to the Principal that treatment for pediculosis (head lice) has been administered. FRAGRANCE SCENT FREE

Please avoid wearing fragrances or scented products to school. Exposure to fragrances or scented products can trigger serious health and allergic reactions for individuals who suffer with asthma, allergies and migraines or who have chemical sensitivities. Therefore, we encourage all employees, students and all visitors to our school to avoid the use of these products while at this school.
